## SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS



This is the core of our work, providing sustainable water supply systems and sanitation solutions to ensure communities have access to safe water and improved hygiene.



3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

Safe water and sanitation ease women's burdens, increasing education opportunities, livelihoods, and safety.

Girls' clubs empower girls to understand their rights, speak out, and support each other.

Improved water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services prevent waterborne diseases, significantly improving community health, particularly in vulnerable populations like children and the elderly.



Providing access to safe water and sanitation, helps communities reduce the economic burden of diseases and loss of productive time, which contributes to alleviating poverty.



Adequate water and sanitation facilities help children, especially girls, to attend school regularly, including during their periods.



#### MASS HYGIENE AND SANITATION PROMOTION:

We support large-scale outreach campaigns in villages and schools across 3 districts to promote hygiene practices and menstrual health. In schools, girls and boys engage in open discussions that challenge stigma, improve health, and build confidence.

#### SCHOOL AND HEALTH CENTRES:

We construct solar-powered water systems, gender-separated toilets, urinals, showers, and accessible facilities. We also support girls' health classes and reusable pad-making workshops to improve school attendance and promote inclusion.

#### **VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS:**

Depending on the community, we install new water points or piped systems, test water quality, and train community members in maintenance.

## THE DISTRICT WIDE PLAN

Working with district, provincial and national partners in Zambia and Mozambique, we support lasting, local solutions to reach 100% coverage of safe water and sanitation, leaving no one behind.




#### **ENTERPRISES DEVELOPMENT:**


We mentor local masons and pump minders, helping them grow WASH businesses that offer reliable, affordable services. Toolkits are available for hire, supporting longterm maintenance and local ownership.

#### DISTRICT DEVELOPMENT AND PLANNING:

We help connect key stakeholders, district councils, NGOs, WASH providers, and local WASH businesses, through coordination meetings and joint training. Together, we identify priorities and align resources to strengthen planning and delivery.

## KEEPING WATER RUNNING





In 2024 we have continued to support **3,629 communities** through maintenance of boreholes that we have rehabilitated, currently reaching **1,335,846 people** with safe water.



Each borehole is visited yearly and monitored remotely quarterly. These follow-ups allow us to maintain and repair boreholes as needed, ensuring a continuous supply of safe water.



## FELIX - HOW A SOLAR SYSTEM CHANGED FELIX'S LIFE



Felix, a 12-year-old student from a farming family, used to rely on unsafe river water for drinking and hygiene at school. His mother had to fetch firewood three times a week to boil the water in an attempt to make it safe.

But everything changed when a solar water system was installed at Felix's school. Now, both the students and community members have access to safe water from the water point, reducing the burden of collecting unsafe water. Felix's mother now only collects firewood once a week for cooking, and Felix has access to safe water and proper toilets.

"Before we had safe water and toilets here at school, I had to carry water from home and use unsafe toilets. At home, my mother spent entire days fetching firewood and water. But since we have water at school, I haven't heard of any of my classmates getting sick."

### MERCY AND NANA - EMPOWERING GIRLS THROUGH MENSTRUAL EDUCATION



In Zambia, some harmful myths portray menstruation as dirty and shameful, discouraging open discussion and proper hygiene practices in schools.

Mercy, 16, shared how stigma makes her feel isolated during her period: "I feel dirty and avoid school because boys make fun of girls on their period."

To challenge these beliefs, Village Water and ECHO have formed school clubs that involve both girls and boys in discussions and debates. "We debated whether menstruation is a dirty process," said Nana, 16. "Only those who believed the myths supported it. I've learned it's a natural, biological process."

These clubs are helping students gain confidence and challenge harmful norms. Nana, who dreams of becoming a lawyer, says the support has improved her self-esteem and understanding of menstrual hygiene.

### RONALD - A JOURNEY AS A VOLUNTEER AND WATER CHAMPION



Ronald, 49, is a married father of five and a committed community volunteer. He works in community health and as an Area Pump Minder (APM), a role he's held since 2011. In 2024, he refreshed his skills in hand pump maintenance through training by Village Water's partner, ECHO.

"I was excited to update my knowledge," he said. Ronald enjoys helping communities access safe water, often volunteering when families can't afford to pay. "I plan to keep supporting villages and reduce borehole downtime. Toolkits will help me respond faster without long travel for tools."

### JULIETA - A MOTHER'S JOURNEY TOWARDS HEALTH AND OPPORTUNITY

Julieta, 33, is a mother of five whose spent hours fetching water from a distant, contaminated river. The task, shared with her 15-year-old daughter Marta, consumed most of their day and led to frequent illnesses in the family.

Since the local waterpoint was repaired, everything has changed. "Now we have safe water near home," Julieta says.
"We have more time for farming and I can sell our produce at the market, giving us a steady income."

Her daughter Marta, now in 8th grade, is thriving. "With safe water, she no longer misses school due to illness and can focus on her future."
